WHO ARE WE?

We are a group of academic professionals, psychologists, middle & high school students, and business executives who are dedicated to Child Abuse Prevention Education (CAPE). Our team includes teachers, faculty & alumni of Porter-Gaud School, leading child education & trauma experts from top US-based child advocacy organizations, and award-winning experts in media creation & marketing.

WHAT IS THIS PROGRAM?

This program contains everything you need for a 30 minute presentation of a critical empowerment message for Child Abuse Prevention for grades three though eight. The key message is "Like adult zebras, there are adult people in your community who care for you and keep you safe from abuse. Know your three safe adults and go to them in an abuse situation." This positive program utilizes the natural instincts of zebras to aid the discussion and make it fun. KnowYourThree was successfully piloted in 2021 with four hundred children in South Carolina and Georgia.

WHY IS IT SO IMPORTANT?

Research shows that most children do not tell anyone of an abuse situation - particularly sexual abuse. If they do, they will most likely mention it only to a peer. Often that peer is uncomfortable with the topic, no action is taken, and the abuse continues. The purpose of this initiative is to empower kids with the information they need to know what abuse is, and the importance of getting help from a safe adult whenever there is an unsafe situation for themselves or a friend.

IS THERE A COST?

It's free! We are all volunteers, creating and distributing positive, innovative, educational content - at zero cost to organizations. CAPELAB donations and Porter-Gaud school resources pay for content production and distribution. All material is free to copy and use under Creative License (CC BY-NC-ND).

No, it enhances it. KnowYourThree amplifies a specific, critical message in an edutainment format. It's a great program for your Child Abuse Prevention month.



But first - Let me ask you a question. Why do zebras have stripes? Any ideas?

Raise your hand. (wait for response)

There are lots of theories. Let's look at some of them....

IS IT TO CONFUSE FLIES?

... One theory is it confuses biting flies.

Think of an airplane landing at the airport - the runway is very clear and marked. But what if there were many landing markings everywhere - like a zebra's stripes. And it all moved around!

The flies could get dazzled by those moving landing stripes and not land. This stops the biting...and this stops disease!

OPTIONAL ADD FOR #3

Ask: How would you test this theory?

Answer: Scientists have tested this theory with dried animal skins. In the tests, they have found more biting flies land on solid colored hides than striped ones.



When zebras pack together as a group, do predators get visually confused?

A lion might be dazzled by a big pile of criss-crossing lines, not knowing where one zebra ends and another begins. It's hard to pick out an individual zebra to attack.



This is Dr. Rubenstein of Princeton
University. He researches the social
dynamics of zebras. He travels to Africa and
performs experiments to answer questions
such as:

- ♦ How do they get along?
- ♦ What alliances do they form with each other?
- ♦ What is their behavior?



Dr. Rubenstein's team built a "Robolion" - a remote controlled, artificial lion robot.

Ask: How could the Robolion be used to observe zebra behavior?

The robolion is used to understand zebras' evasive actions to a danger. Let's test your answers by looking at the Robolion in action...

PLAY THE VIDEO

Ask "How were the adult zebras reacting to the Robolion?" (Get responses)

You see the adult male zebras will observe the Robolion and assess risk for the herd. They protect the young zebras from danger.

With flying drones, computer modeling and Robolions, Dr. Rubenstein seeks to understand zebras' evasive actions to a danger.

Ask: How else might adult zebras protect young zebras from danger? (Get responses)

Let's test your answers by looking at another film created by a high school student based on Dr. Rubenstein's observations.

PLAY THE VIDEO

At the first sight of danger, the young zebras start to gallop away, followed by the mother zebras who help guide them to a safer place.

Other members of the herd follow. The father zebras follow last. This approach maximizes the protection of the younger zebras.

You see the adults work together to keep the lion far away from the young zebras. The safe adults block the danger.



Like us, zebras are social. Adults protect younger zebras from danger.

Like adult zebras, there are adult people in your community <u>who care</u> for you and <u>keep you safe</u> from abuse. People do that too.

Like adult zebras, there are adult people in your community who care for you and keep you safe from abuse.

Safe adults

These people in your community are called "safe adults."

Ask: Who in your community might be safe adults?

Answers should be not be limited to family ... but include pastors, police officers, school teachers...

What does "abuse" mean?

Anything covered by a bathing suit or underwear is a private, personal area.

What does "abuse" mean? Raise your hand. (Get responses)

Abuse means a lot of things, but in general it is when someone hurts us physically, bullies us... or touches our private parts or shows us their private parts. Abuse is against the rules and it can cause harm to you or to others.

ABUSE IS <u>NEVER</u> OK

Abuse is never ok. Abuse is a grown up problem. It is an adult's job to handle the situation and make it stop.

If you are being abused, find a safe, trusted adult and tell them about your situation.

If you are being abused, find a safe, trusted adult and tell them about your situation. No one should have to go through it alone.

Find protection from the adults who take care of you and that you trust.

...and if things don't change, find *another* safe adult until they take action.

Who are <u>your</u> three safe adults? **Exercise:** Have each student write down three safe adults they can go to for an abuse situation.

"Consider people who are not just in your family - but outside too."

Ask volunteers to name their three safe adults and how they know them. Give students examples of potential safe adults. Repeat: "Like adult zebras, there are adult people in your community who care for you and keep you safe from abuse."

Afterwards: "The next time you see your safe adult, share what you've learned here today and tell them you named them one of your safe adults - someone you are comfortable to go to."

Summary

- Know your 3 safe adults and how to reach them.
